Wiring and Track Report: Bill Poteat reported that over 2,000 feet of green cable has been pulled into place, everything needed for the Murphy Branch. Termination of the wiring will start after this Saturday's Open House, the layout may be done for perhaps a month, hopefully less. per Tim, we may move the Digitrax components first, though the system will continue to be turned on at the current panel location. We may use either a timer or other means to make sure that the system if fully powered off at the conclusion of each operating session. Once the Murphy Branch wiring has been completed, the main layout will be attacked one section at a time.

Financial Report: Treasurer Gene Austin reported that with all 2016 bills paid we will have a balance of \$575.20 in our bank account. Gene said only a couple of members remain in arrears for their 2015 dues. (Note: early payees of 2016 dues swelled our coffers by over \$800 at the end of the meeting- many thanks to those folks).

Scenery Report: Frank Steele is working on some new buildings for the future Hot Springs expansion. Tim pointed out the building needs which remain for Robbinsville, Sylva, and Bryson. We also need to complete a new base for the Fontana Lake bed.

New Business: Per our club bylaws, Tim conducted the election for 2016 officers. The incumbent officers were re-elected by acclimation.

In other election news, we welcomed Jerry Rowan* as the newest member of the P&WRRC.

Larry Weed not only suggested but volunteered to work on sound modules to help guide guests through the museum. Both Frank and Bill have some ideas on how we can reasonably install sound cards around our exhibits, perhaps some with proximity triggers.


With an evening full of Open House preparation awaiting the membership, the meeting was adjourned at 7:55PM.

The Royal American Shows was the largest of the rail-borne carnival companies at one time. This shot captures their string of flat cars and some visitors on the midway.






Longtime readers need no introduction to Col. Joe Bost, the world's most acclaimed marksman.
